Don served on active duty in the Air Force for 26 years, retiring in 1987, with the rank of Colonel. His first assignment was pilot training at Williams AFB north of Phoenix, AZ. He then served at Yokota AFB, Tokyo, Japan, (56<sup>th</sup> Weather (Wx) Reconnaissance Wing piloting WB-50 typhoon hunter planes), then Laredo AFB, TX (3640<sup>th</sup> Pilot Training Squadron), Perrin AFB, TX (3251<sup>st</sup> Pilot Training Squadron), Udorn, Thailand (435<sup>th</sup> Tactical Fighter Squadron piloting F4 Phantom fighters ("my very favorite bird") out of northeast Thailand during the Vietnam War), Tempe, AZ (Student, Arizona State University), West Point, NY (Instructor, Mechanics Department), Eglin AFB, FL (3246<sup>th</sup> Test Wing), Naples, Italy (Headquarters, Air South), Wright-Patterson AFB, Dayton, OH (Aeronautical Systems Division, ASD, Air Force Systems Command, AFSCmd).



After leaving active duty in the Air Force, Don had a successful career in defense contracting in Annapolis, MD and Dayton, OH and then teaching math and aviation at a local community college. Don passed away on 11 May 2022, of natural causes.
