Ken served on active duty in the Army (Signal Corps) for 22 years (including service in the Army before entering West Point), retiring in 1981, with the rank of Lt. Colonel. His first assignment was with the 24th Signal Battalion. He then served at Fort Monmouth, NJ (The Signal School, TSS Advanced Course), Boston, MA (Student, Northeastern University), Conus (Combat Development Experimental Center, CDEC), Washington, D.C. (Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers IEEE, International Conference of Computer Vision, ICCV), Alexandria, VA (Organizational Test & Evaluation Agency, OTEA), Pentagon (Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel, ODCSPER), Washington, D.C. (Student, George Washington University). The last 10 years of his military career was located within the Military District of Washington.



After leaving active duty in the Army, Ken had a successful career as a System Engineer at IBM in Northern VA, Austin, TX and Raleigh, NC. Ken passed away on 28 August 2022 from natural causes.
