



Gene Arthur Adams, Jr. Co D-2

This man was a credit to the Corps. His academic achievements were questionable, but the effort he put into them was not. Neither the French nor English Departments could stop Gene in his battle for success, no matter how hard they tried. His easy going manner and outstanding friendliness assure him thirty years of success in the Army.

Born – 12 December 1938, in Nebraska.

To USMA – from Omaha, NE. Appointed from NE, Nickname – “Gino.”

Died – 12 Dec. 2023 (age 85) at Loveland, CO. Buried at Miramar National Cemetery, San Diego, CA.

Military Awards – Bronze Star Medal, Air Medal, Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal.

Schooling – Master of Science MS Degree in Management, Naval Postgraduate School NPS. USMC Command and Staff College.

Gene served on active duty in the Marine Corps for 20 years, retiring in 1981, with the rank of Major. His first assignment was with the 1st Battalion, 3rd Marine Division in Okinawa. He then served at Quantico, VA (Marine Corps School Advanced Course), Vietnam (1st tour - Company Commander, 2nd Battalion 2nd Marine Division and Reconnaissance Company Field Marine Force FMF Atl), Monterey, CA (Student, Naval Postgraduate School NPS), Quantico, VA (Student, USMC Command and Staff College, Okinawa (Ground Forces Western Pacific),

After leaving active duty in the Marine Corps, Gene had a successful career in computers and defense contracting. He worked for the Computer Sciences Corporation CSC (Systems Analyst and Manager), then Titan Systems (Test Manager, Marine Air Ground Task Force Tactical Warfare Simulation MTWS Project). The MTWS software program simulated all the different types of Marine warfare and was used to train battalion, regimental and division staffs. Gene passed away on 12 December 2023 (on his 85th birthday) from complications from blood disorders.

Footnote from Gene – “Since retirement I have been busy by riding our three horses on a daily basis. In the summer this includes 2 to 3 horse patrols per week as a Volunteer for the U.S. Forest Service.”
