Marsh served on active duty in the Army (Artillery) for 21 years, resigning in 1982 with the rank of Lt. Colonel. His first assignment was with 21<sup>st</sup> Artillery and then 4<sup>th</sup> Artillery. He then served at the (18<sup>th</sup> Artillery Missile Detachment), Vietnam (first tour - 44<sup>th</sup> Artillery and then 27<sup>th</sup> Artillery), Ft. Sill, OK (Artillery Advanced Course), Vietnam (second tour – MACV), Norman, OK (University of Oklahoma), Ft. Leavenworth, KS (Command and General Staff College), Norman, OK (Instructor, ROTC Program), Philippines (Advisor, 157<sup>th</sup> Brigade of the Philippine Army, (Readiness Region), Germany (Headquarters, Army European Command, EUCOM).

After retirement from active duty in the Army, Marsh worked as a Logistics Support Manager for the Eaton Corporation, a Department Head for Fairchild Weston Systems Company, and an Aerospace Engineer for the Northrop Grumman Corporation. Marsh passed away on 19 February 2002, from a heart condition.
