His first assignment was with the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA) in Washington, D.C. He then served in Vietnam (1st Brigade, 101st Airborne Division), Washington, D.C. (George Washington University), Army Intelligence Service.

After leaving active duty in the Army, he worked as a civilian military analyst for the government, taught 8th grade mathematics in Baltimore's inner city, and managed a treatment center for delinquent boys.
